Mid-Autumn Moon Festival Open House

Did you know that other than our Chinese Lunar New Year, Moon Festival (also known as the Mid-Autumn Festival) is the second most important and celebrated event each year by the Chinese people?

The Mid-Autumn Festival is a harvest festival celebrated on the 15th day of the 8th month of the lunar calendar which corresponds to around late September to early October. One of the popular myths about the origin of the Moon Festival is found in a story about a young hero named Hou Yi, who lived during a time when there were 10 suns in the sky. This caused great harm to the villagers, so Hou Yi shot down nine of the suns and was given a magical elixir that would make him immortal. But Hou Yi didn't want to live forever without his wife, Chang'e, so he did not drink the elixir and gave it to his wife for safekeeping. One day, a student of Hou Yi tried to steal the elixir from her and to foil his plans, Chang'e drank the elixir and flew to the moon where she still lives and can be seen dancing on the moon during this festival time.

Buck Toy Club Members Enjoy Jin Dui Making Party at Vineyard St. Club House

About a dozen American-born members of the Buck Toy Club participated in a Jin Dui Party on Saturday, October 6 at the clubhouse. Taught by Director Mrs. Wai Kwon Ng Low, the ladies got their hands sticky kneading dough, dicing, slicing and mincing ingredients for the "salty" filling, wrapping mochi in banana leaves, steaming cha gwo, which we locals call "ip jai" and rolling and pressing the jin dui. This hands-on approach allowed everyone to feel the process instead of watching it on YouTube videos. None of the jin dui lasted long as it was all gobbled up before it had a chance to get cold. Everyone had a chance to take home ip jai, all hot and gooey. Those who still understand a little Chinese interpreted Mrs. Low's instructions for their classmates, laughing and cheering each other on.

This follows on the heels of similar Cha Gwo Parties held at the clubhouse by the China-born members who grew up during the Cultural Revolution where traditional cooking methods were placed on the back burner. After moving to Hawaii, these members had to learn a new language and find jobs to support themselves in a new land. Finally settling down after 20 years, they came together last March after seeing Cha Gwo party pictures and videos taking place back in Buck Toy Village and held similar cooking demonstration sessions here. Since these parties held in Chinese, started English-speaking session.

In January, Mrs. Elizabeth Young will conduct a session in making the traditional Chinese New Year's dish, Jai. More information to follow.
